### Overview

In the experiences of large-scale disasters, such as Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake 1995 and Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami 2011, Japanese nurses not only responded to the healthcare and nursing care needs that arose from disasters but also demonstrated at home and abroad their integrated practice in protecting people's lives from disasters and supporting a healthy lifestyle at every stage of disaster risk reduction, response, and recovery. In addition, nurses have been confronting various difficulties on the front line of COVID-19 response. As the disaster response is gaining global attention, this session will review the efforts of disaster nursing and discuss the contribution and the social value of nursing to building disaster-resistant community and safe and secure society.
